

Heritage Week Celebration 2017 Visit to Balmoral Homestead



To celebrate Heritage Week in 2017 the Society arranged to visit the historic homestead on Saturday, 29 April.

Balmoral was built c 1857. The architect was Reuss & Brown and the builder Bringeman & Dewer. The two storey homestead contains eight rooms, four upstairs and four downstairs with extensive cellars under the main house and the two storied servants' wing at the rear. The main building is constructed from externally rendered red brick and originally had a slate roof (imported from Wales as ships ballast), with cedar joinery, all supported on footing of 'a couple of feet of sand' (Personal comment F Blake "Rosebrook"). The only structural alteration to the building was the addition of a sunroom to the rear in 1963.²



Some business houses which operated in Sydney Street South Muswellbrook

The following snippets have been contributed by Bill Spicer. They form part of on-going research of Businesses and people who occupied land in Sydney Street.

The White House


The United States of America has its White House and, not to be outdone, Muswellbrook had its own 'White House'.

Mr E McLean commenced business in August 1916. The business was located in the same building used by Malcolm Campbell when he commenced business in Muswellbrook in 1862.

Mr McLean advertised extensively in the Muswellbrook Chronicle.

Mr McLean died in September 1919. His

widow continued in the business until July 1921 when she sold the business to the Universal Stores Ltd.



The Universal Stores Ltd

The Universal Stores Ltd purchased the business in July 1921. The business appears to have operated successfully for the next 10 years.

M Campbell and Co.

It was reported in *The Muswellbrook Chronicle* on Friday 30 October 1931:

Business change-Campbell and Co. Extended-Back to Foundation Store

Messrs. M Campbell and Co. Ltd announce in this issue that they have purchased the stock and goodwill of the Universal Stores Ltd. The change takes effect on Monday next.

A Coincidence

It is interesting to recall that the firm will on and from Monday next carry on business in the premises where the firm of M Campbell and Co., Ltd., had its beginning. It was there that the late Malcolm Campbell opened up business 70 years ago, and where three years afterwards the late Mr J W Humphries joined the staff as a boy, ultimately becoming the head of a great business which holds a prominent place in the commercial life of every town in the Upper Hunter.

The present staff at the Universal Stores Ltd. will be retained.

On Tuesday 3 November 1931, the following report appeared in *The Muswellbrook Chronicle*:

Among many callers on Monday to Messrs. M Campbell and Co's South Muswellbrook branch was Mr J M Campbell, a director of the company. The firm's new business had a personal interest for Mr Campbell, for it was in that building where he was born, and where his father, the late Mr. Malcolm Campbell, started business 70 years ago....

Eight months later, in May 1932 Mr J M Campbell passed away. A notice advising of the probate of his estate was published in *The Muswellbrook Chronicle* on 7 June 1932.

The advertisement, at right, printed in *The Muswellbrook Chronicle* on 29 July 1932 signifies the imminent closure of the South Muswellbrook branch.


This happened at the time shortly following the death of Mr J M Campbell. It was also in the midst of the great depression.

An advertisement appeared in *The Muswellbrook Chronicle* on 21 July 1933:

To let or for sale - Premises in Sydney Street previously occupied by Universal Stores.

Several short-term occupations of the store occurred over the next few years.
