BEERSHEBA MEMORIAL



The dedication of the statue in Brook Street on Tuesday, 31 October 2017, commemorating the 100th Anniversary of the attack on Beersheba, continues the fine tradition of the people of Muswellbrook Shire in recognizing those who served to protect our country and our way of life. The statue 'Over The Top' honours the legend of the mighty Walers and the brave men who rode them was sculptured by Brett Garling.

The charge of the 4th Australian Light Horse at Beersheba late in the afternoon of 31 October 1917, is remembered as the last great cavalry charge. With time running out for the Australians to capture Beersheba and its wells before dark, Lieutenant General Harry Chauvel, the Australian commander of the Desert Mounted Corps, ordered Brigadier General William Grant, commanding the 4th Light Horse Brigade, to make a mounted attack directly towards the town. The attack was made with the 4th Light Horse Regiment on the right, the 12th Light Horse Regiment on the left and the 11th Light Horse Regiment in reserve'.

Lieutenant-Colonel Donald Cameron DSO and Bar was the Commanding Officer 12th Light Horse Regiment came from Rouchel, NSW.

The Waler horses, so prized for their endurance and speed, have a close connection with the district. The Piercfield property was the assembly point for horses from the district and areas from north western NSW. The name 'Waler' is believed to have originally been given to remounts supplied to the Indian Army because they were supplied rom New South Wales.

The name was adopted and given to all horses sent overseas and especially to those supplied to the Australian Light Horse servicemen.

WAR MEMORIAL QEII SQUARE

After World War I the citizens of Muswellbrook undertook to erect a suitable memorial to those who served in what was supposed to be the war to end all wars.

Over 1000 people were present at the ceremony of unveiling the soldiers Memorial at Muswellbrook on Anzac Day (Wednesday, April 25, 1923). The ceremony was carried out in a most impressive manner, and the beautiful monument seemed, to be speak the solemnity of the occasion. The memorial is considered to be one of the finest of its kind erected in the Commonwealth.³

MUSWELLBROOK MEMORIAL GROVE - VIETNAM WAR MEMORIAL

The Memorial Grove to the north of Muswellbrook between the New England Highway and the railway line. The signs indicate the number killed in each unit.

Four monuments along one kilometre of the New England Highway commemorate the veterans of World War II, National Service, the Korean and Vietnam Wars and the Malayan and Borneo conflicts.

The monument in the photo commemorates those who served in the Vietnam War. The names inscribed on the black granite walls also include the New Zealanders who fell during the war. The memorial has been constructed to resemble a gun pit and its proportions are similar to those that existed in Vietnam. Construction of the memorial was undertaken by the Muswellbrook RSL Sub-Branch.⁴

The memorial was dedicated on Saturday 6 December 2008 by Her Excellency Professor Marie Bashir AC, CVO, Governor of NSW.

DENMAN WAR MEMORIAL



The Denman War Memorial situated in Remembrance Park, Paxton Street Denman is another monument of which the Shire can be proud. The front is inscribed 'In memory of those from Denman and District who gave their lives for their country. We will remember them.' It contains the names from WWI 1914-1918, WWII 1939-1945 and the Vietnam War. The back is inscribed, 'To honour those men from the Denman District who served their country.' It contains the names from WWII, Korea, Vietnam.

The monument was unveiled by G. E. Priest - NSW State President, R.S.L. of Australia on 20 February 1994.

War Trophy Guns



After World War I there was a distribution of War Trophies. Muswellbrook received a Trench Mortar captured at Frammerale on the Western Front, by the 5th Brigade of the Second Australian Division of the A.I.F in France.

The dedication of the Trench Mortar took place on Monday 25th April 1921 at the Court House.

An additional War Trophy, a 7.7 M.M. Gun No. 994 33rd Btn was allocated to Muswellbrook. There followed much discussion of where it should be placed. After a time at the gas works t was repaired. It was placed on the Town Hall Reserve. In 1932 they were moved to

inside the gates at Gerald Park. They also spent some time in front of the court house in Bridge Street. In 1964 the Council arranged for them to be moved to the grounds of the RSL Club. After Club renovations in 1983 they were

placed in front of the RSL Club, fronting Bridge Street. They were moved once again to the north of the Vietnam Memorial Grove on the New England Highway.⁷

Hopefully this latest move may result in a permanent home for them. The latest addition to the Vietnam Memorial is a 105mm M2A2 Howitzer brought into service in January 1972 and purchased by Muswellbrook RSL Sub Branch in February 2013.It is situated on a circular cement base just to the south of the rest area.⁸
