
Thank You to Bill Spicer for Donation

At our February Meeting Bill donated three books to the Society for research. The first called 'More Than A Headline' is an in depth study of the many newspapers that have been produced in Muswellbrook. Excerpts from this

study were produced in our Newsletters last year. The second is called 'The Other

Four Corners' and as Bill said it is not a T V program but a detailed history of the four corners at the intersection of Brook and Bridge Streets. The third and final book he named 'Bits and Pieces'. This book is a collection of sixteen different stories.

The books are not for printing at this stage as he feels that some more information may be added at some future date. They will be available for reading at the Society and will form a valuable collection for research purposes. All three books display Bill's knowledge and experience with local government history and the valuable local government records, many of which are housed in the Society. Without this type of research much valuable knowledge would over time be lost. On behalf of us all and future historians we say a heartfelt thank you.

Sydney Street business

William McNeill

William McNeill was a tailor.

An early reference to the business was contained in an article published in 'Messrs. W McNeill & Co., Tailors who have their place illuminated by gas¹.' (*The Maitland Daily Mercury* on 3 January 1895)





Owner William McNeill - Occupier William McNeill. Description - Tailors Shop. Capital value £300. (Rate book 1897-1898)

Mr McNeill was elected to Muswellbrook Municipal Council in 1896. He served three years as an Alderman. He stood for re-election in February 1899, however he was not successful at the election.

Several items referring to Mr O'Neill were published in *The Muswellbrook Chronicle* on 6 September 1899. One item referred to debts owing to Mr McNeill to be paid to his assigned estate. Another item described the premises in relation to an auction sale: The valuable freehold property in Sydney Street, lately occupied by Mr W McNeill

tailor. The property has a good frontage in an excellent business position, the premises are in good repair and the terms of sale are very reasonable. A third item is a classified advertisement advising William Clendinning, instructed by mortgagee to auction on Monday 11th inst. The property lately occupied by Mr W McNeill, Sydney Street - Good frontage, with large shop, premises in good repair, Title Freehold. There appears to be very few references to Mr McNeill in newspapers after this time.

Sydney Street business

Charles Worms rented a building owned by Harris Clark on the northern side of Sydney St next to a building known as 7 Sydney Street or 'Thorley Building'. The site is now part of the Workers Club Car Park.

Charles Worms and Co

In July 1897 Charles Worms and Co were advertising in Singleton. The business moved to Muswellbrook and were trading on 1 January 1898. Early advertisements referred to women's clothing and boots and shoes in their Christmas sale.

Our Winter Goods.

We have to inform our Customers that it is really impossible for us to issue our price list just now. Our business has made such rapid progress the last four months that we are thinking very seriously of securing larger premises in town, so as to cope with the extra trade. You see we are placed in a much better position than the majority of storekeepers, as the most of our goods are purchased for prompt cash, so that, as it were, we buy at our own prices, and sell far cheaper than the other blokes, and in consequence our business goes on increasing every day. (The Muswellbrook Chronicle Wednesday 16 March 1898)

Our Rose Pink Flannelette at 4 ½ d is the best value in town, sold up the street from 6 ½ d. Well, if you are over the bridge at any time give us a look in—always pleased to see you. A lot of improvements over here lately. Of course, you have seen the new water cart the Aldermen have put on. Quite an acquisition over here - keeps the dust down well. Charles Worms and Co. (The Muswellbrook Chronicle 30 April 1898)

An advertisement was published in *The Muswellbrook Chronicle* on 26 February 1898: Wanted – Smart Boy, for our Boot Department, and to make himself useful. Charles Worms and Co. Muswellbrook.

Worms once advertised: 'See our price list at once. Plenty of the goods left that are advertised. We don't advertise lines that we have not get, for we are no jerry-me-diddlers. Charles Worms & Co.'

At some stage, Charles Worms moved to Bridge Street, immediately south of Eaton's Hotel. In December 1906, Worms advertised as located 'next to Eaton's Hotel'

Mr Charles Worms, who for about ten years has managed the business carried on in this town under the name of Charles Worms and Co. left on Thursday morning last. The business has been closed. (The Muswellbrook Chronicle 20 March 1909) - Contributed by Bill Spicer

The plate as shown here was donated to the Society by Coffs Harbour Historical Society. They were assessing their museum items and felt that it should be returned to the area from which it came. We gladly accepted.

The inscription as seen on the plate reads as follows:

Grocers Produce & General Merchants

A. W. Flanders & Co.

"The Service Stores"

Bridge Street

Muswellbrook

An article in the Muswellbrook Chronicle on Saturday 12 June 1920 states:

New Business – Messrs A W Flanders and Co announce in our business columns today, that they will, on Monday next, commence business as grocers, produce and general merchants in those spacious premises next to Eaton's Hotel. The new firm will specialise in produce and already has several important agencies.

Around 1925, 1926 an advertisement appeared that H R Flanders had taken over the business of A W Flanders.²



² A W Flanders is believed to be a son of H R Flanders. H R Flanders was the Mayor at some stage, resigned and may have been re-elected. Flanders Avenue is named after the Mayor H R Flanders.
