More on Muswellbrook Newspapers – 4th and final part – from Cub Reporter Hunter Valley News

The *Hunter Valley News* was founded by Wayne Logue in 1973. Volume 1 No 1 was issued on 16 May 1973. In June, 1974, Upper Hunter Newspapers took over the *Hunter Valley News*.³



'The Hunter Valley News has moved shop'...was the caption in an advertisement in the 'News' on Wednesday 2 January 1974. 'Don't look for us in the Central Arcade.... our offices are now situated in a converted house at 89 Bridge Street Muswellbrook. That's next to the Plaza Motel....'

The masthead of the *Hunter Valley News* on Wednesday 19 February 2014 includes 'proudly serving the Upper Hunter since 1972'. The paper is home delivered free, has a circulation of 18,170 and published weekly. It is delivered in Muswellbrook on Wednesdays.

In February 2014 the *Hunter Valley News* proudly claimed they were 'More than just a newspaper' and celebrated 'supporting the Upper Hunter community for more than 40 years.' In March 2017 the 'News' was also available, free, at various business and visitor outlets in Muswellbrook, Denman and Scone.

Scone Advocate to Valley Advocate and return

The history of *The Scone Advocate* is recorded on the website Wikipedia⁴:

The 'Advocate' began publication on 7 October 1887 as a weekly broadsheet newspaper, under the ownership of founder Arthur "Advocate" Smith. In 1974, the newspaper was purchased by Western Newspapers Ltd., a subsidiary of Consolidated Press Group, controlled by the Packer family. The next year, Mike Pritchard was appointed as editor, and continued in that role until 1990. In 1976, the newspaper changed to a weekly publication, released Wednesdays.

In 1982, a move to develop the paper into a regional newspaper called 'The Valley Advocate' with a wider-circulation proved unsuccessful. The paper was given away free outside of Scone, but local residents were still required to pay twenty five cents to buy a copy. In 1984, the 'Scone Advocate' banner was restored, with a new publication date of Thursday (which is still the case today. Also in that year, the Packer-controlled Regional Publishers Pty. Ltd. was merged with 'Upper Hunter Newspapers', owned by the McClintock family of Muswellbrook, to form Upper Hunter Publishers Pty. Ltd. This led to the paper being published off-site in Muswellbrook, with its commercial printing division sold to a private company in 1986.

The final issue of the 'Valley Advocate' was printed on 14 March 1984.

Various publications were produced and circulated to the public over the years. Whilst they may not be classified as 'newspapers' they certainly had many attributes of a newspaper. Some of these publications were;

Wilder's Advertising News

This issue of Wilder's Advertising News is dated Tuesday 16 July 1929. The 'paper' was free and issued twice a week. The paper advertised many Muswellbrook businesses including Rixon, Hastie and Baker, C Morris Grocer, Campion Bros, Coroneo Bros. The paper also printed various news items.

It is not known how long the paper was published.

A similar 'free newspaper' titled Fleming's Murrurundi Advertiser was published in 1931.



The Valley Compass

This magazine's first issue is dated 22 November 1997. The Compass was published by Robert McClintock. Robert McClintock (son of Bernie McClintock). The first issue states;

The Valley Compass is a magazine, definitely not a newspaper, although some news items will regularly appear. Body of the journal will contain a miscellany of features and news items from various smaller clubs and organisations. After 3 issues, the Compass announced they were moving from a Bridge Street address to Unit C & D, The Commercial Centre 4 Market Lane Muswellbrook.

It is understood the Compass was issued for a few months



The Entertainer

The Entertainer is a high-quality magazine distributed weekly to hotels, motels, tourist outlets and various shops.

The issue on 3 April 2014 states 'serving the Hunter for over 20 years with a readership of over 4,000 weekly.'

The magazine contains the weekly television programs, entertainment advertisements and stories, arts and craft exhibitions etc.

The Hunter Valley Printing Company produces the magazine. It is also available on the internet.

Visit to Fellows Museum



An interesting result from a research request

'An underground tank, a relic of the convict days in Muswellbrook, was discovered during drilling at the site of the new \$1.5m. Court House in Bridge Street.

On Monday the firm drilling the hole for 85 piers, which are being used in the foundations for the new building, broke through what at first appeared to be an underground well.

The two men climbed into the large cavity and discovered the structure resembled an old tank. The hand made bricks were claimed to be up to 100 years old and had apparently been made by convicts.

The circular shaped tank measured 12ft in diameter and up to 18ft in height.'⁵
