Muswellbrook St James Younger Set 'Mock Wedding' Entertainment

Local residents were agreeably surprised while visitors from other centres were unstinted in their praise as to the wonderful performance staged by members of the St James Younger Set when they were seen to advantage in an entertainment arranged for a two-fold purpose. Firstly as a surprise to Rev. Father Flannagan, who established the Club, and secondly to raise funds for the annual Convent Cabaret.

Announcement that something unusual was to be enacted had aroused considerable interest, and accordingly, the school room was filled to capacity as the big hour approached, and Rev. Father Flannagan, who had been kept in the dark, was surprised and pleased on his arrival to see such an animated gathering.

Eager eyes sought the entrance as the various guest were announced, and rounds of applause greeted the various characters. Naturally, the 'Bride and Bridegroom' were the centre of interest, and as they wended their way in blissful happiness through the thronged room, they were enthusiastically received.

LARCENY. -William O'Brien, a poor, miserable looking scarecrow, was brought up in custody, charged with stealing a swag containing the twenty years' gathering of his mate, a Norwegian, named Neil August Clarsen. The usual defence was set up by the prisoner, namely, that his mate having got on the "tear," he (prisoner) out of pure charity and "mately" feeling, had taken charge of the swag which he was carrying to Scone when arrested.

His mate had arranged to go to Scone with him, but went on the drunk instead, and he (prisoner) thought the correct thing under the circumstances was to hump the "bluey" along, lest it might fall into other less honest hands. There was an air of probability about William's story, and he consequently got off with seven days' gaol.²

This report was noticed by Bill Spicer while researching. Perhaps the prisoner was not too unhappy with a dry bed and seven days food.

New Rail Bridges on Ulan Line

Garry Meissner and I visited the site of the work being carried out on the Ulan rail line at the invitation of the ARTC. The three bridges to be replaced are the southern bridge over the subway, the bridge over Muscle Creek and the bridge over the Hunter River. The bridge over the subway will be replaced in its present position. Many of the pylons have already been installed as has the supporting barriers for the earth work.

Pylons in place west of the subway. These are double pylons with an interior core pylon for safety if a train was to come off the tracks.

The bridges over Muscle Creek and the Hunter River will be replaced with one long bridge. The sections will be cast then fitted together and gradually pushed out over Muscle Creek and then the Hunter River. Preparations of the area has been completed and the pylons will be installed shortly.



Work on sinking the pylons has been temporarily suspended for the breeding season of the flying fox colony that exists along the Hunter River near where the

This flat area has been prepared for the assembly of the sections. The weight of the sections still on the bank must always exceed the weight of the sections that have been pushed out over Muscle Creek and the River.

The crane is used in helping to dig through the top layers of the soil and then the pylon is lowered into the hole and driven deep into the bedrock.

Another pylon casing arrives ready to be hammered into place. Behind the truck can be seen the reinforcement steel which will be placed inside the casing.



To obtain access to the area

between Muscle Creek and the Hunter River so that pylons and abutments can be built it is necessary to build a bridge over Muscle Creek. Fortunately, a temporary bridge was obtained. As sections are pushed out over the creek more sections are bolted onto the back.

This photo shows the bridge out over Muscle Creek heading towards the abutment already formed on the other side. At the present time all access to the other side is through the caravan park. This will not be possible when the pylons and abutments are being constructed for the permanent bridge. All the concrete and steel for the huge sections will be trucked in through the site in Lower Williams Street.

This site was the Caltex Depot and before that the site of Muswellbrook Superior School.

The present bridge over the Hunter River. A train driver noticed that steel work in the top section of the bridge had cracked.

A temporary fix was to bolt a plate over the crack so trains could continue to cross. All four corners were plated.

This deterioration plus the subsidence at the bridge over the subway led to the need to replace these bridges as quickly as possible.

One of the plates appears as the blue section in the top centre of the photo.
